


Identify and support advocacy needs of departments: assess priorities through discussions, annual survey, workshops 2



N=37; 29 missing (44%)


Response highlights

65 responses




- a. Yes; we have a process of formally tracking faculty advocacy efforts

69. Do you compensate for advocacy (protected FTE or part of quality measures/bonus payment)?



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
70. Has your institution established guidelines or restrictions regarding advocacy?




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72. Has your department established guidelines or restrictions regarding advocacy?

Why three?

Three = basic organizational grouping, helps audience remember
Short, simple, colourful, convincing
Back up by proof
Repeat, repeat, repeat!

Media Relations Training Manual

Each cohort of medical students is scheduled for 4 sessions within 4-6 weeks

- Advocacy Basics
- Lobbying
- Op Ed
- Media

Engage in a live session and submit op ed for publication.

GME TIME COMMITMENT

Every resident has 12 weeks total for elective time.

- 4 weeks in PGY2 (two 2 wk)
- 8 weeks in PGY3 (two 2 wk + one 4 wk)

Plan: 12 weeks total for QLA track 2-4 weeks for QLA electives



The osteopathic programs have 14 weeks elective time allowing to start experience in PGY1
